Find Regis Library’s online reference books through [Lumen](#), the library catalog, or via our databases, [Credo Reference](#) and [Gale Virtual Reference](#). Print titles are located on the second floor of Dayton Memorial Library.

A few reference books to get you started:

Why begin with reference books?

Reference books provide factual and background information about a topic.

Use reference books to explore your topic before you begin searching for articles. You’ll have a better feel for appropriate search terms, recent developments, and key thinkers.



Callout Boxes:

- Top Right:** AnthroSource will automatically search for variations of keywords. For example, search for the term *ethnicity*, and AnthroSource will retrieve articles containing the words, *ethnic*, *ethnicity* and *ethnicities*. Search for a specific term or word by enclosing it in quotation marks, for example "liberation theology"
- Bottom Left:** Students sometimes mistake book reviews for scholarly articles. Keep in mind that both will be included in your results. If a book looks promising, look it up in Lumen or Proquestor!
- Bottom Right:** AnthroSource allows keyword searching only. However, you can limit the results of your search by selecting from a list of concepts to the right of your results.

Other Useful Databases:

Academic Search Premier – This article database provides access to many, anthropology-related journals that are *not available through AnthroSource*. Search Academic Search Premier by subject (use the thesaurus to find terms) or by keyword.

Annual Review of Anthropology (within the Annual Reviews series) - This publication includes analytic reviews of primary research literature in Anthropology. Don't pass up this excellent resource; you may find a review of literature on your topic.

Other Useful Databases cont'

How do I know if an article is "scholarly?"

Scholarly articles include references and are written by experts. Scholarly articles are reviewed by an editorial board prior to publication.

CSA's Sociological Abstracts - This database includes citations and abstracts for scholarly literature about sociology and related disciplines, such as anthropology, urban studies, and criminology. Find abstracts for articles from nearly 2,000 journals, as well as references to book reviews, books, book chapters, dissertations and conference papers.

Academic Onefile - This multi-subject database provides access to several, full-text, anthropology-related journals, and indexing for many more. Search Academic OneFile by subject (Use the *Subject Guide Search*) or by keyword.

Finding Books:

Begin your search for books with [Lumen](#), Regis Library's online library catalog. [Lumen](#) is located under the *Books* tab in the [Anthropology Research Guide](#), or by selecting Search Library Catalog on the *Library Quick Links* menu. Circulating books at Dayton Memorial Library are located on the third floor. Most anthropology books have call numbers beginning with GN.

Not finding what you are looking for in Lumen?

You can also use [Prospector](#) to search for books and other media outside of Regis University Library. [Prospector](#) contains records from over 20 front-range library catalogs. Books requested through [Prospector](#) usually take a few days to arrive at Dayton Memorial Library, or another Regis campus.

Books that are unavailable at Dayton Memorial Library AND through [Prospector](#) may be requested through [InterLibrary Loan](#).
